Important International Declarations and Conventions

Below is a list of links to the websites of key United Nations documents concerning violence against women, including a brief description of each.² These are presented chronologically, and reveal a trend in UN and regional attention to violence against women. Check to see if your country is a signatory to the various conventions and declarations, and use them as tools to ensure that your government is upholding the commitments it has made.

1979 Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW)
CEDAW is recognized as one of the six major international treaties. General Recommendation 19 (1992) makes clear the obligation of state signatories to end gender-based violence.

1993 Vienna Declaration and Programme of Action

A major victory for activists, Vienna formally recognized that women's rights are human rights.

1993 Declaration on the Elimination of Violence Against Women (DEVAW)

DEVAW defined violence against women, linked it to human rights, and called on governments to take specific steps to eliminate it.

1994 Inter-American Convention on the Prevention, Punishment, and Eradication of Violence Against Women (Convention of Belém do Pará)

Belém do Pará was a convention amongst the nations of the Americas region that recognized violence against women as a human rights violation and called on states to act to prevent, punish and eradicate it.

The ICPD Programme of Action called the elimination of violence against women a cornerstone of population and development programmes.

1995 Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action

“Violence against women is an obstacle to equality, development and peace. Violence against women both violates and impairs or nullifies the enjoyment by women of their human rights and fundamental freedoms.” The Beijing Platform set out several key objectives for governments to focus on to address violence against women.

1999 Optional Protocol to the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women

The Optional Protocol to CEDAW (1999) allows individuals and groups to bring petitions on violations of the convention before the CEDAW Committee.

2000 Millennium Declaration

In this historic agreement, states parties to the Millennium Declaration pledged to combat violence against women and implement CEDAW to promote democracy and strengthen the rule of law, and strengthen respect for human rights.

2001 Declaration of Commitment on HIV/AIDS, UN General Assembly Special Session on HIV/AIDS

The Declaration of Commitment recognized the elimination of violence against women as key to the reduction of women's vulnerability to HIV/AIDS and set time-bound targets for nations to address HIV/AIDS-related issues.

2002 Rome Statute of the International Criminal Court

The Rome Statute includes rape, sexual slavery, forced prostitution, forced pregnancy, forced sterilization, and other forms of sexual violence in its definitions of "crimes against humanity" and "war crimes."

2002 Council of Europe Recommendation Rec(2002)5 of the Committee of Ministers to member states on the protection of women against violence

The Council of Europe Recommendations re-affirm the commitment of member states to eliminating violence against women and set out a series of measures that member states must take to fulfill their obligation to ending all forms of violence against women..

2003 Protocol to the African Charter on Human and Peoples' Rights on the Rights of Women in Africa

The Protocol on the Rights of Women in Africa was adopted in 2003 and came into force on the 25th of November, 2005 after the necessary fifteen countries ratified it and made it into law. This protocol is a milestone in the protection and promotion of women's rights in. At least sixteen countries so far have ratified the Protocol.

2005 United Nations Commission on Human Rights Resolution on Violence Against Women (E.CN.4/2005/L.51)

This resolution calls for measures to be taken by states to eradicate violence against women; it stresses states' duty to prevent, investigate and punish all acts of violence against women and girls. The resolution addresses the impact of violence as a cause and consequence of HIV/AIDS, the need for women to have autonomy over their sexuality and control over matters related to their reproductive health and choices, and the need for the criminalization of marital rape.

2005 United Nations World Summit

States agreed to continue efforts to eradicate violence against women including addressing impunity for VAW in situations of armed conflict.
